

## **Second foreign language courses**

To pursue research in one's major discipline, high reading comprehension and expressive ability in foreign languages are required. As business and research activities overseas are increasing, it goes without saying that students need to master communication in foreign languages so that they can give presentations and discuss at international conferences. Learning about foreign customs and cultures is also requisite.

Given that information can be exchanged easily across borders through computer networks, we offer graduate level second foreign language instruction in various formats. We focus acquiring practical ability in foreign languages, absorbing foreign culture, and gaining understanding about how foreigners think.

It is advisable to take 2 units continuously over the 1st and 2nd quarters, or over the 3rd and 4th quarters.

### **Learning Goals**

A) To acquire knowledge of basic grammar and vocabulary

In this course, students acquire knowledge of basic grammar and a necessary vocabulary to improve their communication skills in the foreign language.

B) To improve understanding and expressive abilities in the foreign language

In this course, students improve their skills in reading, listening, writing and speaking through interpreting texts (or audio-visual materials) and practicing conversations.

C) To deepen understanding of foreign cultures, histories and societies

Through engagement with various texts and audio-visual materials, students deepen their understanding of foreign cultures, histories and societies, which will enhance intercultural communication and study abroad.
